The funicular railway station, opened in 1894, is in piazza De Gasperi. In just a few minutes it takes you up to Brunate, known as the "balcony" of the Alps on account of its strategic location and breath-taking views from several different aspects.

The hill is home to splendid Art Nouveau villas built from the end of the nineteenth into the early years of the twentieth century by the new wealthy middle classes seeking to make names for themselves. Floral motifs and eclectic elements typify the taste of the owners in an era marked by luxury.

You can get to San Maurizio, on foot or by shuttle service, where the Volta Lighthouse is located. It was built in 1927 by engineer Gabriele Giussani as part of celebrations on the centenary of the death of Alessandro Volta. The 143-step spiral staircase within winds up to the top terrace. There are two paths back to Como, one runs alongside the cable car and the other passes by the Hermitage of San Donato, founded by the Benedictines in the fifteenth century.

CERNOBBIO

Cernobbio is a renowned tourist resort on the shores of the lake at the foot of Monte Bisbino. Along its banks there are some villas of rare beauty, including Villa d'Este and Villa Erba, which is now an exhibition centre, Villa Bernasconi and Villa Pizzo.

It is reachable by boat or by taking a pleasant walk of around forty minutes: from the grounds of Villa Olmo, along the Kilometre of Knowledge, a green and cultural corridor of great natural beauty set in a unique landscape. The kilometre links the old parklands of the exceptionally beautiful historic mansions that overlook the lake, namely Villa Olmo, Villa del Grumello, and Villa Sucota. After the Kilometre of Knowledge the walk or cycle ride continues along the first limb of the eastern slopes

From Cernobbio you can proceed to the Sanctuary of the Blessed Virgin on the summit of Monte Bisbino, taking a scenic route that offers breath-taking views of the lake.





CASTEL BARADELLO

Making use of the regular service offered by Navigazione Lago di Como steamboat company, you can sail around the first branch of the lake starting from Como, with stop offs, if you wish, at Cernobbio, Moltrasio, Torno and Blevio.

The boat trip is a romantic and tranquil experience that gives visitors the opportunity to admire villages and landscapes from another perspective and view villas barely visible from road level.

Worthy of particular note at Cernobbio are Villa Erba, an architectural gem built at the end of the nineteenth century and today important as an exhibition centre, Villa d'Este, long ago the residence of Cardinal Tolomeo Gallio, now an elegant luxury hotel of world renown, and Villa Pizzo with its beautiful gardens.

At Moltrasio, on the other hand, Villa Fontanelle, years ago the residence of the Versace family and Villa Passalacqua, a neoclassical building with a beautiful Italian style garden. The village of Torno, with its picturesque harbour can also be seen from the water as can the sequence of elegant villas at Blevio, among them Villa Troubetzkoy, in Russian style. It is possible



to travel around the whole Lake Como by boat.

Starting from Piazza San Rocco or from Piazzale Camerlata, you can walk to the foot of Castel Baradello, rebuilt in the twelfth century by Frederick I, better known as Barbarossa. He had it built on the remains of an ancient sixth century fort. Under the rule of Azzone Visconti, the 19.5 metre high tower was raised by a further 8 metres in the fourteenth century. The castle has become the symbol of the city itself over the intervening centuries.

If you continue on to Respaù you will find there a splendid vantage point followed by the area of the archaeological excavations of Pianvalle. This area was that of the settlement of Comum Oppidum, an important centre inhabited by the Celts of the Golasecca culture of the Iron Age.

The settlement came to light during a series of digs which began in 1976, with many of the archaeological finds now exhibited in the Pre-Protohistoric Archaeological Museum section.

The walk can proceed on to the hill of Sant'Eutichio where there is a large iron cross and wonderful views of the city and the whole first branch of the lake.

Spina Verde Regional Park stretches along the hillcrests northwest of Como. It is an area with many interesting features, including the natural landscape itself, archaeological and historical sites, as well as many places of worship that include the Basilica of San Carpoforo, the church of San Rocco in Cavallasca and the cross of Sant'Eutichio. These are all indicative of how this has become a hub of religious culture.

Spina Verde is criss-crossed by many trails. Thirteen of these were set up by the Park authority and provide many different kinds of routes. These may be natural, scenic, sporting, historical or religious, while some also take in the archaeological ruins of the proto-historic Como and the medieval Castel Baradello. There is also military history to explore at the First World War trenches that have recently been opened up to the public.

We recommend one of the easiest, trail number 4, the 45minute Monte Caprino route that starts from the Basilica of Sant'Abbondio and number 2, which is a 3-hour walk from Monte Olimpino cemetery.

Como is famous as one of the most desirable of tourist destinations thanks to its enviable geographical position on the shores of the lake, framed by the embrace of the hills. The panorama it provides has proven a powerful inspiration to scientists such as Alessandro Volta, thinkers like Cesare Beccaria, musicians of the ilk of Liszt, Rossini, Bellini, Verdi and Wagner and writers of the calibre of Manzoni, Fogazzaro, Stendhal, Flaubert and Foscolo.

Como is a historic city, the first traces of which can still be seen in the Spina Verde parkland, dating back to the Bronze Age. The city on the lakeside itself was established by Julius Caesar in 59 BC and called Novum Comum, from which its modern name derives

Como is a city of sport, with a tradition of success in fencing, rowing, football, basketball and water polo. The city is also home to tennis, rugby, ice skating, ice hockey, golf and sailing. The Cycling Tour of Lombardy comes to the town which also sees powerboat racing and is home to the famous Como Aero Club. The first Cruyff Court in Italy was made here in 2014 and bears the name of the Stefano Borgonovo foundation.

Como has been the city of silk for many centuries, famed for its production of fine fabrics that have gone all over the world and remains a reference point for all major fashion houses and clothing manufacturers. The importance of the industry is marked by the presence of the Silk Museum and the work of the Ratti Foundation

Alessandro Volta, the inventor of the battery and discoverer of natural gas as energy source, was born here. Artefacts and records relating to his life are kept in the Temple dedicated to him. A lighthouse bearing his name watches over the city from above, entering into a dialogue with the new monument by Daniel Libeskind, "Life Electric" on the breakwater.

Yearly events are "Fiera di Pasqua" (Easter market), in Viale Varese, open Holy Thursday to Easter Monday; "Fiera del Libro" (book fair) in Piazza Cavour, "Fiera di Sant'Abbondio", on the occasion of Sant'Abbondio patron saint's festival on August 31 with traditional food and animal fair. Como is an academic centre and home to Insubria University and the Como branch of the Politecnico di Milano. Students flock to these centres of learning from all over the world.

Open air shopping is a popular pursuit in the old streets of historic Como, where there is an extensive pedestrianised area with many quality shops, an abundance of places providing food and wine and a variety of kinds of

Como is a city of art. The old town features elements from its Roman and medieval past, as well as religious buildings and palaces, and a lavish array of luxury houses along the banks of the lake. The ancient city centre also offers a winding pathway of rationalist buildings that leave their modern stamp on

Como is a city of culture and music with events all year round, such as Miniartextil, exhibitions at Villa Olmo, the Como City of Music Festival, the Lake Como Film Festival and the broad review that is Como Live, which brings a buzz to city in the summer months. There is also Parolario, the reading and cultural event, the drama season at the Teatro Sociale, music from the Giuseppe Verdi Conservatory and the Università Popolare di Musica, ComON the European creativity hub, the Orticolario garden show, the Festival of Light, the Poetry Festival, the Festival of Land & Water, the re-enactment of the Palio of Baradello and the celebrations for the patron saint Sant'Abbondio. At Christmas time, the Città dei Balocchi enlivens the centre with many activities, coupled with the illuminations involving all the main monuments.

Como is a city of Peace and was awarded the title of Messenger of Peace City by the United Nations in 1987, while the Monument to the European Resistance is a representative work for this vocation it profoundly feels.

In Como you can enjoy truly unforgettable moments. It is an enchanting town and favoured destination for many travellers, intellectuals, royalty and aristocrats over the years. Even today, businessmen, actors and celebrities, athletes, students and tourists all are drawn to and seduced by the Como



RELAX AND SPORTS OUTSIDE

Como and its territory offer many possibilities to spend some time outside, relaxing by the lake or in the mountains as the one of Triangolo Lariano. Experts can try the "Alta Via dei Monti Lariani" which runs from Cernobbio to Sorico, on the west side of Lake Como. Also, the territory offers many itineraries for bikers.

You can also swim in the lake and relax on the beach next to Villa Olmo which offers two swimming pools (one for children), a café, a garden, beach umbrellas and loungers. On the other side of the lake, close to Villa Geno, you can find a beach, a garden to sunbathe, and a swimming pool for children. To swim indoor, Sinigaglia swimming pool offers a wellness area with sauna and Turkish bath. You can also go for a run by the lake where you can find many possibilities to train.



AERO CLUB COMO

Como is famous for its seaplanes. In 1913, less than three years after the first seaplane recorded flight, one of the first conferences within the international "Lakes Grand Prix" won by Roland Garros was held in Como.

Among historical seaplane places, Como is the only one which is still active. Activities are managed by Aero Club Como, one of the most important seaplane organizations, and the oldest one worldwide, as proven by Guinness World Records™.

Seeplanes don't disturb the natural life of Lake Como.

In front of Aero Club Como hangar, therefore, you can see many birds, as mallards, coots and swans, which swim and relax in the lake.



ROMAN COMO

The modern city, with its grid-iron road layout, reflects the ground plan of the settlement the Roman Novum Comum grew out of. The main east-west axis of the Decumanus road corresponds to the current Via Independenza and the Cardo maximus to Via Cesare Cantù.

Starting from the Porta Torre gate, in largo Miglio, within a nineteenth century building on the right, is Porta di Como Romana (Como's original Roman Gate). This was the main Milan access point and headed north, across the lake or along Via Regina. The archaeological remains of the gate were discovered in 1914 and recently became part of the new museum itinerary.

Continuing along Via Cesare Cantù, eight marble columns come into view as used for the neoclassical façade of Liceo Classico Volta (High School). These were from the paleo-Christian baptistery of San Giovanni in Atrio, where they had in fact already been reused from an unknown monument of the Roman age.

Turning right in Via Giovio we enter Piazza Medaglie d'Oro which is home

to the Museo Archeologico Paolo Giovio (Archaeological Museum) which houses exhibits from the local area from the Palaeolithic era to the late Roman period. The Roman world itself is illustrated by the finds discovered in and around the city as well as with models and graphic reconstructions. Architectural marbles testify to the sophistication that must have characterised the city in the early centuries after Christ.

Turning right into Via Perti after proceeding along Via Vittorio Emanuele II, the visitor can go to see the Terme (Roman Baths) of Viale Lecco. Their remains are in a recently built multi-storey car park and are open to public view. They were built in the second half of the first century AD and are an indication of the importance of the city at that historical moment. They expanded in the second century AD and fell into disuse in late antiquity, while the area outside the walls came to be occupied by a necropolis.

The visit ends with a walk down Via Indipendenza, the Decumanus, to Piazza San Fedele, which was most likely the site of the ancient Roman Forum.

RISORGIMENTO COMO

The route starts with a visit to the Garibaldi Museo Storico at Palazzo Olginati, where, as the memorial plaque on the façade says, Garibaldi stayed in 1866. The first two rooms, telling the stories of the years 1848-49 and of 1859, emphasize, with the many and varied exhibits, the active role that the patriots of Como played in the fight to liberate Como from the Austrians and the unification of Italy.

In the hall that looks at the years 1848-49 there is a coat of arms upon which stands the Austrian eagle. This came from the old Town Hall in via Cinque Giornate. Among the various items of memorabilia are the iron plates used to shelter from the assault at the barracks of San Francesco and fragments of an Austrian flag of Como from the "Prohaska Regiment", taken by the people of Como from the Austrian drummer who was held prisoner after the Five Days of Como. The 1859 room takes us back to the famous battle of San Fermo of May 27 1859.

Leaving the museum, along Via Balestra, you come to Viale Battisti bordered by the southern city wall, in front of which is the modern Court building and the former church of San Francesco, which is now Spazio Ratti, and which is all that is left of the Franciscan convent that the Austrians used as barracks.

In the mid-nineteenth century there was, along this section of the city walls, a great open space that the Austrian soldiers used for their drills and it was also here that they surrendered and finally handed over their flag to the Como patriots.

At the end of the avenue you come to Piazza Vittoria in which stands an imposing statue of Garibaldi, sculpted by Vincenzo Vela. inaugurated in 1889 to mark the thirtieth anniversary of the liberation.

The tour ends at the Pinacoteca, or art gallery, where a painting by Francesco Capiaghi is exhibited, with the wording "After the surrender, Como March 22, 1848": the painting depicts the surrender of the Austrian garrison in Piazza Vittoria after the Five Days in March 1848. The painter was himself an eyewitness to the event, and recalled with it on the occasion of its fiftieth anniversary.

The route must not end without a visit to the romanesque Basilica of

Sant'Abbondio, with its twin bell towers, in which there are splendid

fourteenth-century frescoes. In full romanesque style is the Basilica

of San Carpoforo situated close to Piazza Camerlata.

The route continues to Piazza del Popolo, home to Casa del Fascio, a masterpiece of Italian rationalism designed by Giuseppe Terragni in 1932 and completed in 1936. The building is now home to Guardia di Finanza, the tax enforcement force.

Walking along the lakeside you can visit the "rationalist quarter", between Viale Puecher and Viale Sinigaglia. The area was subjected to architectural redevelopment that was important in terms of new materials used, as well as formally and in terms of the building models adopted for the constructions, with a very high priority being given to functionality.

Straight on to Novocomum, a block of flats designed in 1927 by Terragni, with its presentation of walls and glass surfaces. It was dubbed the "transatlantic liner" on account of its shape and size.

The visit continues with Casa Giuliani Frigerio, the last building designed by Terragni between 1939 and 1940, and an admirable example of its kind in its treatment of architectural volumes.

Also part of this district are the sports and leisure facilities made along the lakeside strip: these particularly include the Idroscalo (1930), the Yacht Club (1931), the Canottieri Lario boating club (1931) and the stadium (1927). The route concludes with the Monumento ai Caduti (War Memorial), built in 1933 by brothers Attilio and Giuseppe Terragni who were inspired by a sketch by Sant'Elia. It is a building in the form of a 33-metre high tower, which houses in its shrine a granite monolith bearing the names of the 750 fallen from Como in the World Wars. The staircase within has 140 steps that lead from the crypt to the top terrace from which there are unparalleled views of the city.

Of great importance are also the Asilo Sant'Elia (kindergarten) in Via Alciato, whose design was developed by Giuseppe Terragni in 1935, and the fountain in Piazzale Camerlata designed by Cesare Cattaneo and Mario Radice in 1935, to finally be built only in 1962.

WALK ALONG THE SHORE OF COMO VILLAS **VOLTA'S HERITAGE** In Piazza Vittoria there is a fine view of the remains of the medieval With an evocative walk along the west shore of lake Como you can

admire many neoclassical villas built between the eighteenth and the nineteenth century. In 1959, the local government created a "romantic promenade" offering citizens and tourists a wonderful itinerary rich of beautiful sights and elegant buildings.

Villa Carminati, designed in 1787 by architect Felice Soave, is a small and elegant villa with double open gallery and decorated with statues

Villa Saporiti, now headquarters of the Provincial Administration, also known as "la Rotonda" for its shape, was built on the project of Leopoldo Pollack and decorated with various sea deities.

Villa Gallia, also property of Como's Provincial Administration, was built in 1614 by abbot Marco Gallio in the place where Museo Gioviano (XVI century) was situated. The museum was erected by Paolo Giovio to host his personal collection of paintings, the one of Uomini Illustri (Illustrious Men), now at Pinacoteca Civica. The building is simple and characterised by a portico with three arches.

All villas are surrounded by lush gardens. Further, Villa Parravicini Revel is well recognizable thanks to its neoclassical and majestic structure, with Italian garden, while Villa Volonté has two symmetrical wings, with frontons decorated with bas-relieves and statues, and connected through a veranda.

At the end of the walk stands the famous neoclassical Villa Olmo, architect Simone Cantoni's masterpiece, and erected by marquis Innocenzo Odescalchi. Villa Olmo was first property of the Raimondi family and later the Visconti di Modrone family that transformed and enriched it before donating it to the Municipality of Como in 1924. Villa Olmo, with its beautiful Italian garden in front and its English garden in the back, is now home to crowd-pulling art exhibitions.

The habit of Lake Como villas dates back to Romans and it is strictly linked with the history of tourism around the lake.



The route starts from the Museo della Seta (silk museum), in Via

Castelnuovo, which tells the story of silk production in the city from

the late nineteenth to the early decades of the twentieth century.

Exhibits include the machines and tools employed and takes a look at

the role of the textile sector in the development of the local economy

The origins of silk spinning in Como date back to the sixteenth

century, but in the late nineteenth century the textile industry acquired

overwhelming importance to become the primary economic resource

for the Como area also thanks to the work of Pietro Pinchetti, founder

The route starts from Tempio Voltiano (Volta Temple). This is a neoclassical style structure, donated to the city by Francesco Somaini to the design of architect Federico Frigerio, and opened in 1928. It was intended to be the new venue to host the original scientific instruments of Volta, as well as reconstruction exhibits for those that the fire of 1899 destroyed during the Great Volta Exhibition. This was staged in Como on the centenary of the invention of the first battery. The ground floor displays much precious equipment, machines and tools of Volta's lifetime. The upper loggia introduces

In the town center there is Piazza Volta named after the monument to the scientist, opened in 1838 and designed by Pompeo Marchesi.

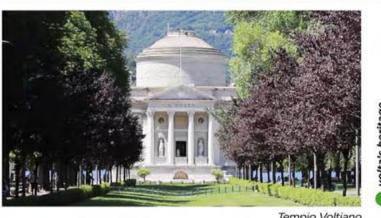
Volta was baptised in the church of San Donnino, in Via Diaz, where a plaque commemorates the event and it was in the same church that the physicist's funeral was held.

Via Volta 62 is the house where Volta was born on February 18, 1745 and in which he died on March 5, 1827. The house had been purchased in 1536 by Zanino Volta and then owned by Carlo Pizzala in 1862, who had it restored to give it the appearance it has today.

Not far away is Torre Gattoni (Gattoni tower) which was acquired in late eighteenth century by Canon Giulio Cesare Gattoni. He set up a physics lab here in 1783 where Alessandro Volta often went to study and carry out experiments.

Opposite Porta Torre in Via Cesare Cantù is Liceo Classico Alessandro Volta. It used to be the location of the Real Ginnasium school of Como, where Volta taught -from 1774 to 1778. In 1865 the school was named after him.

The itinerary can take in a visit to the Faro Voltiano (lighthouse) in Brunate, built in 1927 on the occasion of the celebrations for the centenary of the death of Alessandro Volta, as well as the Tomba di Volta (tomb of Volta) in Camnago Volta, a small neoclassic style temple built in 1831 and decorated with statues and relief work. The structure also contains a fine Carrara marble bust carved by Giovan Battista Comolli.

THINGS YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW ABOUT COMO

The locomotive and train of Luisa Aiani Parisi In the gardens by the lake you can find an example of locomotive and, in the playground nearby, a small and colorful stone train for kids by Luisa Aiani Parisi.

Cosima Liszt Cosima Liszt, daughter of Hungarian pianist and composer Franz Liszt and Marie d'Agoult, was born on Christmas Eve 1837 at "Albergo dell'Angelo" in Piazza Cavour. There you can find a commemorative plaque.

The green dragon If someone from Como invites you for a drink at the "green dragon", don't expect to sit in a fashionable café! The green dragon is a fountain in Piazza Cavour, where to get fresh still water from the jaws of a dragon.

The frog The northern door of the Cathedral is called "door of the frog" because of a frog trying to catch a butterfly, sculpted in the beginning of 1400. Touching the frog means good luck.

The ruins of the castle Teatro Sociale, which is the main theater in the city, was built in 1813 on the ruins of "Castello della Torre Rotonda", whose XIII century perimetral walls are still visible along Via Bertinelli, Via Indipendenza and Via Bellini.

The Chimera and the dragons The "door of the dragon" in San Fedele Basilica (oriental side apse) shows a medieval bas-relief where a Chimera biting a dragon gets bitten by another dragon.

The mummy At the Archeological Museum you can find the sarcophagus of Isiuret, priestess of God Amon. This is one of the most famous pieces of

the Egyptian collection. The mummy is shown to the visitors once a year. Dama della Cortesella One of the oldest neighborhood of the city is the area around via Vitani, Via Muralto and Via Olginati that survived demolition. In Via Vitani, Dama della Cortesella peeps out

The cannon shot If you hear a cannon shot while walking around the city, don't panic! The cannon is loaded with blanks and strikes noon. It is situated midway to Brunate.
